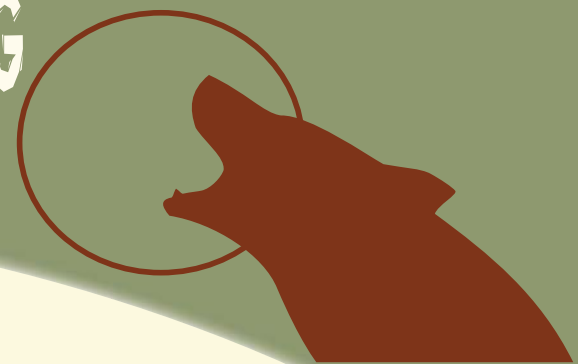

National Wilderness Stewardship

The National Course is held annually in Missoula, Montana. This five day course includes a mandatory three-day, two-night field trip into one of Montana's wildernesses. Course emphasis is on interpreting and applying the 1964 Wilderness Act, agency policy, and wilderness management principles to on the ground decisions. Current and participant provided wilderness stewardship case studies make for an interactive, challenging, and realistic session.

Target Audience: Senior-level decision makers

Regional Wilderness Stewardship

Course emphasis is placed on applying the Minimum Requirements Analysis and identifying requirements to preserve wilderness character while providing for public use. Upon completion of this four day, interagency course students will be able to identify and analyze opportunities and needs in complex wilderness stewardship situations, develop interdisciplinary solutions, and advise other personnel in the principles and field practice of wilderness stewardship.

The Wilderness Act

2-3 hour, self-paced course. Recognize how the Act applies to wilderness issues. Acquaint yourself with contents of the law.

Minimum Requirements Analysis

2-4 hour, self-paced course. Learn to make defensible minimum requirements decisions. Apply the Minimum Requirements Decision process to wilderness issues.

Wilderness Stewardship Planning Framework

8-10 hour, self-paced course (plus additional activities). Learn how to develop and implement a management action plan. Relevant, practical advice and engaging examples.

Visitor Use Management: Fundamentals

1-2 hour, self-paced course. Learn fundamentals of Visitor Use Management. Prerequisite for other VUM courses.

Visitor Use Management: Strategies

3-5 hour, self-paced course (plus additional activities). Identify general and specific management strategies to address biophysical and social impacts. Learn the essential role of visitor education in managing visitor use.

Visitor Use Management: Monitoring Impacts & Use

3-5 hour, self-paced course (plus additional activities). Learn a monitoring program development process. Examine the systems for monitoring campsites, trail impacts, and visitor use. Optional section on monitoring visitor encounters.
